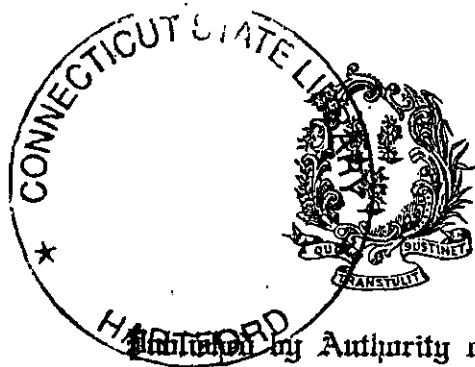

§ 1164. **Deprivation of rights on account of alienage, color, or race.** ^{1894.} Every person who subjects, or causes to be subjected, any other person to the deprivation of any rights, privileges, or immunities, secured or protected by the constitution or laws of this state, or of the United States, on account of alienage, color, or race, shall be fined not more than one thousand dollars, or imprisoned not more than one year, or both. ^{Rev. 1888, §1418.}

§ 1165. **Fictitious notice of birth, marriage, or death.** Every person who shall knowingly publish a false and fictitious notice of any birth, marriage, or death, shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars, or imprisoned not more than six months. ^{1898.} ^{Rev. 1888, §1419.}

§ 1166. **Malicious prosecution.** Every person who shall falsely prosecute another for any criminal charge, without probable cause, and with a malicious intent, unjustly to vex and trouble him, shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars, or imprisoned not more than one year. ^{1890.} ^{Rev. 1888, §1420.}

CHAPTER 83.

Offenses Against Public Property.

§ 1167. **Destroying magazines of provisions.** Every person who shall wilfully burn or destroy any magazine of provisions, or of military or naval stores, belonging to this state or subject to its jurisdiction, or any public building, shall be imprisoned in the state prison not more than ten years. ^{1777, 1801.} ^{Rev. 1888, §1421.} ^{See §1.}

§ 1168. **Attempt to destroy magazines of provisions.** Every person who shall wilfully attempt or conspire with others to violate any of the provisions of § 1167 shall be imprisoned not more than five years. ^{1801.} ^{Rev. 1888, §1422.}

§ 1169. **Injury to public buildings, furniture and voting booths.** Every person who shall wilfully injure any public building, or who shall wilfully injure or carry away any stove, stove-pipe, or furniture, in and belonging to any such building, or who shall wilfully deface or injure a voting booth or compartment, shall be fined not more than one hundred dollars, or imprisoned not more than six months, or both. ^{1832.} ^{Rev. 1888, §1423.} ^{1899, ch. 129.} ^{See §1.}

§ 1170. **Injury to bridges.** Every person who shall wilfully remove or destroy any of the materials belonging to or used for the security or preservation of any bridge, shall be fined not more than fifty dollars, to be paid to the county in which such bridge is situated. ^{1827.} ^{Rev. 1888, §1424.}

§ 1171. **Injury to trees on public grounds.** Every person who shall injure or destroy any tree growing on any public square or grounds, without the ^{1847, 1857.} ^{Rev. 1888, §1425.}

§ 1169. See § 1 for definition of "public buildings." Complaint must set out with particularity the "injury." 62 C. 131. "Wilfully" means in a spirit of wantonness or with an evil intent or guilty purpose. 71 C. 742.
